On Tuesday, Freedom Inc., a Madison nonprofit, said it will "mobilize over \$50,000 in rapid response over the next few days. Freedom Inc. received requests from elderly residents and families with young children for masks and air purifiers. The group called for issuance a "shelter-at-home" order when the air quality index rises above 151 ("unhealthy" is 151-200) and protective equipment to essential workers. The Madison Ultimate Frisbee Association canceled games on Tuesday night "to ensure player safety". At American Players Theatre in Spring Green, rehearsals moved indoors Tuesday, and the Wednesday evening performance of "The Liar" was cancelled. "We want to get to (the audience) before they leave their house and decide to picnic." The Dane County Farmers' Market, held downtown on Wednesdays and Saturdays during the summer, has no contingency plan for poor air quality. The Farmer's Market assistant manager is "stocking up on N95 masks". The DNR is constantly updating its <u>air quality conditions map online</u>. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources said monitors in Madison were reading 256 and 233 as of 10 a.m., which is in the "very unhealthy" category, the second worst category behind "hazardous." "Wisconsin is currently observing some of the highest concentrations of particulate air pollution on record," The small particles in wildfire smoke can irritate the eyes, nose, and throat, and can affect the heart and lungs, making it harder to breathe. Authorities recommend keeping outdoor activities light and short, and wearing an N95 mask when outside, especially if for an extended time. Typical weather trends and patterns make it unlikely it will get this bad again this summer, said a National Weather Service meteorologist.

Chicagoans awoke on Wednesday morning to a second day of smoky air enveloping the city, obscuring the skyline and shrouding Lake Michigan in a whitish haze. The air quality remained unhealthy, and public health officials warned residents to take precautions before venturing outdoors. In cities throughout the Midwest, smoke from Canadian wildfires continued to disrupt daily life. The Air Quality Index in Detroit spiked to 337, a measure that placed the city's air in the "hazardous" category; Cleveland reached 272. Established by the Environmental Protection Agency, the index runs from 0 to 500, the higher the number, the greater the level of air pollution. Chicagoans were largely spared severe effects from wildfires earlier this month when dangerous smoke affected the Northeast and pockets of the Midwest for days on end. But they had no reprieve on Tuesday, when the authorities classified the air as unhealthy in the city and in other parts of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin. Mayor Brandon Johnson of Chicago warned residents, especially children, older people and those with heart or lung disease, to stay indoors if possible, or to wear masks if they had to be outside, to avoid the worst effects of the smoky air. City officials opened six community centers for people, and moved all park district camps and public school activities indoors. In New York, Gov. Kathy Hochul said early Wednesday that air quality in the western and central parts of the state was at unhealthy levels. The day before, Mayor Eric Adams of New York City urged people to take a mask if they leave home. Nearly 500 active wildfires were burning in Canada Wednesday, according to the Canadian Interagency Forest Fire Centre, in one of the country's worst wildfire seasons in decades. More than 250 of the fires were burning out of control, the agency said. An air quality meteorologist at the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, said the wildfire season in Canada usually doesn't even begin until early July, so Americans in northern states may have to face the threat of poor air quality for weeks to come. Here's what else to know: In Wisconsin, the Department of Natural Resources issued an air quality alert for the entire state, saying that conditions were severe enough to stay inside with windows closed. The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency on Tuesday issued its 23rd air quality alert of the year, a record high, as a layer of smoke hovered over much of the state. The alert, set to expire on Thursday, covers much of the southern and eastern areas of the state. Global warming make wildfires more prevalent or intense.

The sky was smoky in Milwaukee, Indianapolis, and several other metropolises. In Detroit, smoke combined with a dense fog to limit visibility to below a quarter-mile early Wednesday. Populations on the East Coast were under air quality alerts Wednesday, including the Washington, D.C., area. The quality was expected to worsen and spread up and down the coast, infiltrating the New York City region and as far south as the Carolinas into Thursday. Particulate levels set record highs Tuesday for the past two decades in Buffalo, New York; Cincinnati; Grand Rapids, Michigan; Madison, Wisconsin; and Milwaukee, the Weather Channel reported. "You can smell it bad," said a man beginning a run along Chicago's lakefront. "I run a hundred miles a week, so this is going to be dangerous today. You can feel it. ... Just even

parking right there and coming out, I can feel it in my lungs." The downtown Columbus, Ohio, skyline was immersed in haze this week. Three U.S. cities ranked among the top five major cities in the world with the worst air quality Wednesday morning: Detroit, Chicago, and Minneapolis, according to IQ Air's live ranking of major world cities. Washington, D.C., made the top 10. According to AirNow.gov, huge swaths of the Midwest had air quality in at least the red, or "unhealthy" level, including most or all of the states of Iowa, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, and Pennsylvania. Parts of Minnesota, Missouri, Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, and New York were also in the red on a national map. The air was "very unhealthy", purple on the air quality index map, in parts of Wisconsin, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Michigan. "It's kind of miserable some days because you can't spend a lot of time outside," said a man in St. Louis Park, Minnesota.

## In Buffalo, 'chlorine smell is already shifting over to more of a campfire smell.'

Smoky and hazy conditions returned to Buffalo and Western New York on Wednesday, as smoke from Canadian wildfires once again stretched into the Great Lakes region. Public health officials warned everyone to limit their outdoor activities, and said those with serious health problems, including lung and heart issues, should not venture out at all. In Buffalo's northern suburbs, the smoky haze mingled with overcast skies, and a smell reminiscent of a chlorinated swimming pool hung in the air. "I don't know why it smells that way in particular, but it's not healthy," said a meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Buffalo. "The chlorine smell is already shifting over to more of a campfire smell, which should get stronger throughout the day." In downtown Buffalo, a live webcam showed reduced visibility and fog, mixed in with the smoky haze, creating unusually dark conditions for a summer morning. Thursday the smoke should push toward Rochester, she said. The Air Quality Index in Buffalo on Wednesday was in the "unhealthy" range, or having a value between 150 and 200, according to the website airnow.gov, which tracks air quality. Healthy air has a value of 50 or below.
