Phoenix's Month in Hell: 31 Days of Extreme Heat Tests the City

Reporting from Phoenix

July 31, 2023.

Patients with heat stroke and burns from the asphalt are swamping hospitals. Air-conditioners are breaking down at homeless [shelters](#). The medical examiner's office is deploying trailer-sized coolers to store bodies, for the first time since the early days of Covid. For 31 straight days, from the June 30 through July 30, Phoenix hit at least 110 degrees, breaking its 18-day record in 1974. The city last week, racked up the most 115-degree days ever in a calendar year, part of a global heat wave that made July Earth's [hottest month](#) on record.

This is Phoenix's July in hell in the city of 1.6 million. A family is spending hot days at a cooling center, their suitcases clustered around them, as their trailer has no power. It was 118 degrees outside, then they had nowhere to stay after the center closed down that evening, like thousands homeless around Phoenix. Their summer is a game of survival, bouncing between libraries, supermarkets, and relief centers during the day, and sleeping in motels, cars, or shelter beds at night. In Europe [these time-tested sustainable techniques are going a long way](#). Extreme temperatures in July would have been ["virtually impossible" without the influence of climate change](#). Circle the City, a medical charity, treats homeless across Phoenix. "People's temperatures are at 100." Circle the City's mobile medical buses are breaking down in the heat. Phoenix [reported](#) 25 heat-related deaths this year, and are investigating an additional 249 deaths. Hospitals around Phoenix treated [more people](#) for heat ailments in July, infusing them with cold saline or packing them into ice-filled body bags. "We have heat cramps to heat stroke and death." Tinkerbelle, a dog, was given booties so he can walk outside without burning his paws on the pavement. People burn their legs and backs by falling on pavement that can heat up to 180 degrees. A woman in her 80s fell outside her home, then lay on the searing pavement for two hours. Hiking trails have been closed at midday for more than a month to protect hikers (and the paramedics who have to rescue them). The Newspaper Arizona Republic [cried out](#) There is a homeless-outreach charity called AZ Hugs.

It's Been a Hellish Summer for the Mediterranean. And It's Not Over. Record heat and wildfires have turned summer holidays into nightmares and called into question the future of cherished tourist destinations.

Reporting from Rome

July 29, 2023

As a family sat vigil over a coffin containing the body of an elderly relative, the wooded hills around their apartment building in Palermo burned from wildfires. Winds blew the blazes closer, torching cars, dumpsters, sheds, and electricity poles. Then the apartment building was set on fire, forcing its inhabitants to flee. **Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates.**

"We wanted to leave the house, but then the flames were behind the door," a resident told Live Sicilia television. She and her family wrapped their faces in wet towels and, looking for a way out, "knocked on the door where there was the cadaver." They all managed to escape before the coffin and the rest of the house went up in flames. [Italy and its Mediterranean neighbors](#) in July saw wildfires and heat waves turn summer paradises into hellscape. [Fires in Greece](#) caused wartime-scale airlifts of tourists and ammunition depots to explode. Sicilian churches burned with the relics of saints inside them. Tourists looking for a summer holiday found an inferno, feeling buyer's remorse. A 64 year old woman from Bosnia prepared for a 2 PM tour of the Colosseum. The temperature was 100 degrees Fahrenheit and an ambulance checked the blood pressure of another tourist. Tourists on the Greek island of Rhodes grabbed hoses to extinguish fires around a resort. Italy and Greece, which depend on summer tourism are staring at a smoke-filled future. Tourism would drop by 9 percent in the Greek Ionian Islands in a world that reached four degrees Celsius of warming, according to a 2023 European Commission report, but tourism would increase by about 16 percent in (cooler) western Wales. For centuries, southern Mediterranean natives have hidden behind the thick walls of their homes and sealed the shutters from the afternoon heat. Now hospitals to fill up with the old and stricken. Local vendors and tour guides shift to act as frontline health care workers for wilting tourists. July will be [Earth's hottest month ever](#). [Copernicus Climate](#)

[Change Service](#), stated that temperatures in Italy reached 118 degrees. In Greece outside work was banned in the afternoon. Archaeological sites were closed. 400 wildfires devastated olive groves, pine forests, homes, farms, and flocks. Greek authorities evacuated 20,000 tourists from the island of Rhodes in an operation that the British news media compared with the evacuation of Dunkirk. The death toll in Greece hit five, including two water-bombing plane pilots that crashed while trying to put out fires. In Madrid, the few people out at midday in the Barrio de las Letras avoided the embedded quotations from Quixote, blinding in the sun, and walked in the slivers of shade alongside buildings. In Sicily, fires forced the closure of the island's two main airports, Palermo, and Catania. The island's governor, lamented arsonists, "crazy people" compounding the problem, and lamented relics consumed by fire. A parish priest wrote on [Facebook](#) after fires engulfed the church of Santa Maria di Gesù in Palermo. On July 28<sup>th</sup>, Pope Francis sent his thoughts of compassion to the victims of climate change.

Africa, Algeria

July 25, 2023.

Wildfires devouring swaths of Algeria's Mediterranean coast have killed 34 people over two days, as an extreme [heat wave](#) sears North Africa, Southern Europe and the sea between them. The dead include 10 soldiers aiding rescues across Algeria's forested Kabylia region. Another 16 people died in the fires in the village of Ath Oussalah, according to Berber TV.

One villager had lost her daughter. "I wish her home burned down but she was still alive," the woman told onlookers in the village. The fires forced 1,500 households to evacuate and caused 1,700 homes to lose power. Plumes of smoke rose from at least 16 cities east of the capital, Algiers, including Bejaia, Jijel and Tizi Ouzou. The government deployed 8,000 emergency responders, and said on July 25 that 80 percent of the 97 fires were contained, but 13 stayed out of control, and had spread to neighboring Tunisia. Nightmarish heat waves are caused by [climate change](#). In Greece there were [mass evacuations](#) of residents and tourists. In Algeria, temperatures have reached 135 degrees Fahrenheit, or 57 Celsius; in Tunisia, they have hit 120 degrees, or 49 Celsius. Water taps are running dry in many cities. Some water is available for only half a day, every other day. Relentless heat contributed to the fires, but rumors of arson are rife. Algerian officials announced they would refer any evidence of foul play to courts that normally handle terrorism and organized crime cases. The Algerian government to look into compensation for the victims.
