Larry the Litigator. What is your stand on indoor residential wood smoke emission particulates?

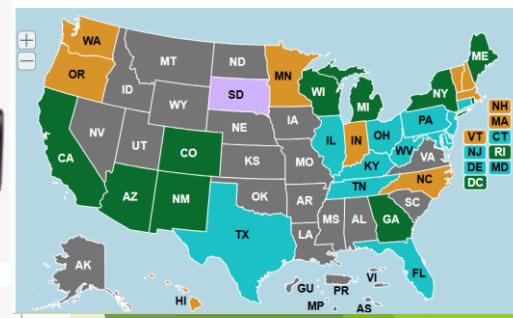

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) sets income limits that determine eligibility for assisted housing programs including the Public Housing, Section 8 project-based, Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher, Section 202 housing for the elderly, and Section 811 housing for persons with disabilities programs. HUD develops income limits based on Median Family Income estimates and Fair Market Rent area definitions for each metropolitan area, part of some metropolitan areas, and each non-metropolitan county.

Larry the Litigator. So, what's new?

Doctor Guy. The alternative to wood burning for home heating of Heat Pumps that work down to 40 degrees below zero and double as air conditioners. In 2024 there are Heat Pump Rebates of up to \$8,000 based on a sliding income scale. As of November 16, 2024 ten states and Washington DC have received full funding from the Department of Energy DOE to launch one or both rebate programs HOMES and or HEAR (HEAR includes Heat Pump Rebates) The ten states are Arizona, California, Georgia, Hawaii, Indiana, Maine, New Mexico, New York, Rhode Island, Washington and Wisconsin. Larry the Litigator. Let me just interject and close with these facts. Consumers can find out if their household is 80 percent of Average Mean Income at https://www.huduser.gov/portal/datasets/il.html#2023_query Click the button that says Click Here for FY 2024 Income Limits (ILs) and see if your household is 80 percent of Average Mean Income! If your household is 80 percent, you are eligible for the entire \$8,000 Heat Pump Rebate! And closing with these facts about the HEAR program which includes Heat Pump Rebates!

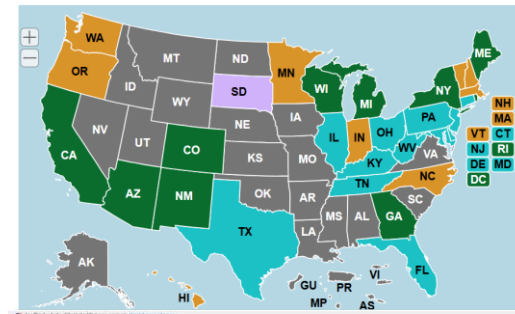
