1 World Governments Corruption [RAWSEP View](#) A new term called state capture could replace the limited term corruption for corruption built into a state system The examples given in this article of countries considered to have state capture are Russia Timor Leste Indonesia Nepal the Philippines Kenya Tanzania Morocco Madagascar Peru and Paraguay and [RAWSEP adds](#) Hungary since Orbán allies seized the most read newspaper in Hungary recently see Point 5 of this webcast [From the article headline](#) Forget petty bribes State capture is corruption so deep it is shaping the rules of democracy itself Beating the dangerous influence of private interests on governments requires independent judges journalists and a courageous civil society [Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization](#) November 4 2025 A global youth revolt is shaking the foundations of political power In just a few months millions of young people have taken to the streets across continents from Timor Leste Indonesia Nepal the Philippines Kenya Tanzania Morocco Madagascar Peru and Paraguay to denounce corruption and collapsing public systems The spark is familiar governments accused of looting public wealth while ordinary citizens face unemployment rising costs poverty and failing services These digitally connected protest movements leaderless borderless and fast moving have toppled governments in Nepal Peru and Madagascar The anger is not abstract It is directed squarely at political and economic elites who have turned public office into private estates What they are confronting often without naming it is state capture a form of corruption so deeply embedded that it shapes the rules of democracy itself Most people think corruption is about a politician taking bribes or a public official pocketing cash for a favor That is the low hanging fruit petty or grand corruption both corrosive but familiar But there is a deeper more dangerous form of rot state capture Not simply corruption of the system It is corruption as the system Where ordinary corruption bends the rules state capture rewrites them It is the moment when oligarchs corporations criminal networks or even foreign governments turn the machinery of democracy into a mechanism for their own enrichment and power In its grip elections become hollow rituals reforms are cosmetic and citizens find themselves living in states that look like democracies on paper but function like cartels In Tanzania for example state capture is not just a political issue it is a generational crisis threatening the future of democratic participation The term state capture popularized by World Bank analysts in the early 2000s to describe post Soviet states was meant to explain why some transitions to democracy produced oligarchies instead In Russia a handful of businessmen seized control of strategic industries during the 1990s then fused themselves to the Kremlin under Vladimir Putin The state became neither free market nor socialist it became a patronage machine run by insiders South Africa is another textbook case As evidenced by youth movements across Africa and Asia meaningful change can sometimes necessitate extraordinary measures widespread protest or the involvement of the international community Recent global protests hint at the potential for grassroots movements to challenge entrenched narratives They are reminders that democratic renewal rarely comes from the top it is forced from below by citizens youths and students those who refuse to accept that their governments are bought and sold State capture is the most dangerous mutation of corruption that governs corruption that legislates corruption that silences It is the enemy not just of clean government but of democracy itself

**points of the article** Solar geoengineering has great downsides and reversal of Solar engineering itself at some point will precipitate reversal to a jump in Global temperatures Research into Solar Geoengineering began in the United Kingdom this April **From the article headline** Solar geoengineering in wrong hands could wreak climate havoc scientists warn Geoengineering The Guardian Blocking the sun may reduce global heating but rogue actor could cause drought or more hurricanes report finds **Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization** November 4 2025 Solar geoengineering could increase the ferocity of North Atlantic hurricanes cause the Amazon rainforest to die back and cause drought in parts of Africa if deployed above only some parts of the planet by rogue actors a report has warned However if technology to block the sun was used globally and in a coordinated way for a long period decades or even centuries there is strong evidence that it would lower the global temperature the review from the UK Royal Society concluded The world is failing to halt the climate crisis and the researchers said that in future a judgment might need to be made between the risks of geoengineering and the those of continued global heating which is already costing lives and livelihoods The logistics of a large scale geoengineering effort would be daunting the experts said but the cost would be small relative to climate action billions of dollars a year against trillions The researchers emphasized that geoengineering only masked the symptoms of the climate crisis and did not tackle the root cause the burning of fossil fuels Geoengineering could only complement the cutting of emissions not replace it they said If geoengineering was halted abruptly but emissions had not been reduced there would be a termination shock of rapidly rising temperatures 1 to 2C within a couple of decades that would have severe effects on people and ecosystems unable to rapidly adapt This is not a question of whether solar geoengineering is safe as it is clearly not without risks said a Professor at the University of Reading who led the report However there may come a point where those risks are seen to be less severe than the risks of insufficiently mitigated climate change In April the UK Advanced Research and Invention Agency launched a 50 million pound government funded geoengineering program which will include small scale outdoor experiments The Professor who is leading the Aria program said the looming threat of climate tipping points was a strong reason to research solar geoengineering Some previous planned outdoor experiments have been cancelled after strong opposition
