1 Trump Officials Accused of Bullying Tactics to Kill a Climate Measure Nations were poised to approve the first fee on pollution from ships That is when the Trump administration began the threats Among other threats from US officials Secretary of State Marco Rubio personally called officials in several countries to threaten financial penalties and other punishment if they continued to support the ship pollution agreement [RAWSEP View](#) When coming up with a reason for killing a pollution regulation measure that would slow global warming and slow the adverse health effects of particulate pollution the Trump rationale was that without air pollution regulation businesses would prosper [Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization](#) The New York Times November 6 2025 More than 100 nations were poised last month to approve a historic deal to slash pollution from cargo ships That is when the United States launched a pressure campaign that officials around the world have called extraordinary even by the standards of the combativeness of the Trump administration according to nine diplomats on its receiving end An ambassador from Asia was told that if he voted in favor of the plan the sailors of his country would no longer be allowed to disembark at American ports Caribbean diplomats were told that they could be blacklisted from entering the United States These and other threats including tariffs sanctions and the revocation of US visas of diplomats effectively killed the deal according to the nine American European and developing nation diplomats directly involved in the negotiations The White House the State Department and the Energy Department acknowledged derailing the deal and repeated their opposition to international efforts to address climate change They said the shipping fee would have hurt the American economy They said the US worked with Saudi Arabia to defeat the shipping fee and that helped other nations that had reservations about the agreement to vote against it But foreign diplomats said they were stunned by what they described as nasty and very personal threats made by State Department officials which were mostly aimed at leaders from poorer or small countries that are economically dependent on the United States Some of the delegations were summoned to the US Embassy in London for these discussions Most countries had been ready to vote for the plan which would have imposed a fee on heavily polluting vessels to push the industry to clean up It was negotiated over several years by the International Maritime Organization a United Nations agency that

oversees shipping policy But the Trump administration was able to block the vote the nine diplomats said after numerous countries backed away in the face of the threats from the Americans Senator Sheldon Whitehouse Democrat of Rhode Island was briefed on the events by negotiators who were directly involved Whitehouse called the strategy of the Trump administration a shock and awe thuggery approach Details of the Trump actions come as world leaders meet in Belem Brazil for three weeks of United Nations climate negotiations For the first time in 30 years the United States is not sending high level representatives to the annual UN climate talks and may not dispatch any technical staff either Trump is withdrawing the US from the 2015 Paris agreement the global pact among countries to rein in climate change He has called global warming the greatest con job ever perpetrated on the world and said that the science was developed by stupid people After blocking the shipping agreement Secretary of State Marco Rubio praised the Trump coalition building efforts Rubio also issued a warning Should this initiative or any other similar one emerge from the UN bureaucracy again our coalition against it will be ready and larger

Midsize commercial airports cargo hubs and private jet fields A smaller number of midsize airports that see significant commercial traffic cargo hubs and airfields popular with private jet operators are also slated for cuts Those include Anchorage International Airport Cincinnati Northern Kentucky International Airport Dallas Love Field William P Hobby Airport in Houston Indianapolis International Airport Louisville International Airport Oakland International Airport Ontario International Airport in California Portland International Airport Teterboro Airport in New Jersey End of list As travelers waited in suspense on Thursday to learn whether their flights would be among those canceled starting Friday morning the government agencies behind the mandatory cuts to air traffic spent most of the day in silence This is a political move by the Trump administration to try to force Democrats to accede to their budget and priorities which cut health care and nutritional benefits Representative Steve Cohen of Tennessee the top Democrat on the House subcommittee overseeing federal aviation said in a statement Thursday The announcement said the cuts would roll out gradually affecting only 4 percent of air traffic at the affected airports on Friday and building to 10 percent by November 14 The Airports that will be affected by flight reductions are shown on this map With just hours before the Friday morning rush airlines appeared relatively untroubled by the

looming cuts which experts said would likely amount to only minor disruptions for most major carriers. But to administration critics that only reinforced the idea that the radical changes administration officials had announced on Wednesday were mostly for show. New Yorkers bracing for canceled flights and hectic airports will have the latest GOP shutdown stunt to blame. Sean Butler, a spokesman for Gov. Kathy Hochul of New York, said in a statement: "Next week air traffic controllers, some of whom have taken on supplementary jobs to make ends meet, are bracing for a second missed payday." Last Friday the national airspace came close to chaos when 35 facilities experienced significant controller absences known as staffing triggers, creating long delays at many of the major airports in America. But the new restrictions were announced at the end of a week that had been remarkably functional with the FAA posting only a handful of notices about staffing triggers. Staffing-related delays have begun to tick up again. An FAA advisory from Thursday evening noted that 17 air traffic facilities were experiencing staffing triggers with related average delays of over an hour at Boston Logan International Airport, Chicago O'Hare International Airport, Newark Liberty International Airport, and Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport. Allies of the Trump administration insisted Thursday that the national airspace was on the brink of disaster, blaming Democrats for playing a potentially deadly game by refusing to back the GOP pitch to fund the government without any preconditions. The National Air Traffic Controllers Association has insisted that its members are showing up to work despite the added stress of working without remuneration through the shutdown and remain committed to keeping the skies safe.

The late night TV show Jimmy Kimmel Live! is stepping up to help during the ongoing US federal government shutdown by opening a new center for food donations. The ABC program announced the program titled the Jimmy Kimmel Live Big Beautiful Food Bank on Instagram on Tuesday just after Trump reaffirmed his plan to block SNAP benefits despite the earlier order of a federal judge for the administration to use emergency funds to continue the food assistance program. Cutting SNAP benefits creates uncertainty for American children, seniors, and families, the post said. To support our community members in need, we are starting a donation center in our Hollywood backlot to benefit the L.A. Food Bank and Saint Joseph Center. If you are in L.A., please come by to donate food, and if you are not, please consider supporting your local food banks. The message also noted that specific donations such as crackers, trail mix, fruit snacks, 100 percent juice boxes, dried fruit, cereal boxes, wipes, diapers, facial cleanser, deodorant, soap, lotions, oral hygiene items, and feminine products would be appreciated. Before the Kimmel announcement, Trump posted on his Truth Social platform that SNAP benefits would be given only when the Radical Left Democrats open up government and that the benefits were haphazardly handed to anyone for the asking, as opposed to just those in need, which is the purpose of SNAP. Kimmel, known for his outspoken criticism of the Trump administration, also recently took aim at the Trump Great Gatsby-themed Halloween celebration. You know, throwing a party at your private golf club where the theme is rich white people hours before millions of Americans are set to lose their food assistance, might be the most Trump move of all time, Kimmel said Monday night. It felt like the last big bash before the Epstein files come out. Meanwhile, the Kimmel popularity has soared and reportedly surpassed The Trump following a dispute with the administration that led to his show being briefly taken off the air in September, according to a recent survey. The Kimmel suspension was announced on 17 September after he criticized the Trump administration's handling of the killing of the rightwing political activist Charlie Kirk the previous week. Brendan Carr, Federal Communications Commission chair and a Trump ally, allegedly

threatened to revoke licenses of ABC affiliates unless the network acted against Kimmel. The decision sparked protests, debates about free speech, and boycotts targeting Disney, the ABC parent company. The network reinstated Kimmel six days later with many industry peers crediting the reversal to those who had joined the boycott.

Published last week the 17 page missive of the tech billionaire called for a strategic pivot away from focusing on slashing emissions and towards preventing poverty and suffering. It was quickly picked up by some on the right including Trump who hailed it as a much needed backpedaling on climate efforts. I WE! just won the War on the Climate Change Hoax. Bill Gates has finally admitted that he was completely WRONG on the issue Trump posted on Truth Social. Gates said in an interview with Axios on Monday evening that The Trump post was a gigantic misreading of the memo and that he was increasing his funding to climate and health. But he added that with climate aid to the global poor countries often choose between the two issue areas. This is a numeric game in a world with very finite resources Gates said. But funding for emissions reduction need not come at the expense of aid to eradicate hunger or poverty said Zeke Hausfather a research scientist at Berkeley Earth. Where I think I disagree with Gates fundamentally is this idea that by taking money away from climate we would suddenly have a lot more money for these other programs. We do not necessarily live in a zero sum world. How Bill Gates is playing both sides of the climate crisis. In his memo Gates wrote that global warming will not lead to the demise of humanity. This misunderstands warnings of climate scientists said Katharine Hayhoe chief scientist at the Nature Conservancy. I have not seen a single scientific paper that ever posited that the human race would become extinct. It is a straw man the way he is proposing it she said. He is speaking about it as if scientists are saying that and we are not what we are saying is that suffering increases with each 10th of a degree of warming. The memo from a very influential person who controls a lot of money hinges on an inarguably a false binary between a world where everything is fine and literally the end of the world said a climate scientist at the University of California Agriculture and Natural Resources. In reality a lot of bad things that can happen in between he said. Climate policies have helped the world avert worst case climate scenarios but the track the world is on now would still yield massive amounts of human suffering. The Gates memo is disconnected from the way the world works. For instance it posits that when the world warms some outdoor work will need to pause during the hottest hours of the day and governments will have to invest in cooling centers and better early warning systems for extreme heat and weather events. Though everyone deserves air conditioning the reality is that many parts of the world do not have it. The Tuesday conversation about the memo came just days before the start of the Cop30 global climate summit in Brazil. The talks will present an opportunity to truly take on the climate crisis said Hayhoe. We have to be talking about phasing out fossil fuels she said. RAWSEP interjects that we also have to phase out and eliminate entirely indoor residential wood burning and industrial wood burning. Wood burning emits 2 point 8 times the PM 2 point 5 and CO2 as the fossil fuel coal burning.

that came at a time when British policymakers and lawmakers are confronting economic challenges. For the Britain policymakers a moment of reckoning seems to have arrived. This month lawmakers, central bankers and the fiscal watchdog of the country are all confronting the challenges of an economy that is growing but is also weighed down by high inflation, high debt levels and low productivity. This quandary will feel familiar to policymakers in other countries, including France, where debt levels are high and the government and public are not aligned on how to tackle it. But for Britain a history of sluggish productivity growth, unsatisfactory living standards and weak investment have come to a head. Economists are pushing policymakers to make choices which could be deeply unpopular that they hope will make the finances of the country more sustainable and create the foundations for faster economic growth. The costs of not acting now are quite high, said an economist at the National Institute of Economic and Social Research. The British chancellor of the Exchequer, Rachel Reeves, has said it is time to make tough choices. The Labor Party, just three weeks before she will announce her second annual budget, Rachel Reeves, the chancellor of the Exchequer, gave an unexpected speech on Tuesday in which she warned that she would be taking decisions in the national interest, not for political expediency. When I was appointed chancellor, people put their faith in me to take our country forward, not to be swayed by political convenience, not to always do what is popular but to do what is right, she said. In the budget, Ms. Reeves is expected to either increase taxes or cut spending in order to find tens of billions of pounds if she is to stick to her chosen rules on lowering debt. But the chancellor recently presented her spending plans, so raising taxes seem to be only one way out of this bind. Ms. Reeves did not say in her speech that taxes were going to increase, but analysts have said she appears to be preparing the waters for an unpopular decision. The Labor Party promised before it was elected into government last year that it would not raise taxes on working people. Breaking that pledge is likely to infuriate many voters and provide ammunition to her political opponents. Economists at the National Institute of Economic and Social Research and the Resolution Foundation, another think tank, are among those recommending Ms. Reeves raise income tax. The chancellor has sought to transform the stagnant economy of Britain without having much money to do so. She has spent more on the National Health Service and increased public sector wages, a splurge that has helped the economy of Britain grow. It is set to be the second fastest growing economy in the Group of 7 this year, after the United States. But the measures paid for by raising taxes on certain groups, including businesses, farmers and wealthy foreign residents, have not been enough to supercharge growth or cover other spending needs, such as on welfare and higher borrowing costs. Ms. Reeves is expected to return to the public at the end of the month to ask them for more. The Office for Budget Responsibility of Britain, an independent watchdog, is expected to lower its productivity forecast. The Bank of England, on Thursday, the Bank of England made its own tough choice. Policymakers held interest rates steady at 4 percent, breaking their recent pattern of quarterly rate cuts amid concerns over stubbornly high inflation. Prices rose 3 point 8 percent in September from a year earlier, nearly double the target of the central bank. For much of this year, the nine person rate setting committee has been deeply divided on how best to manage an economy where price pressures are uncomfortably high, but the labor market has been showing signs of weakness, with the unemployment rate creeping upward. But caution won this week, with five members voting to hold rates. A spending surge by the British government has bolstered the economy of Britain, which is projected to be the second fastest growing economy of the G7 this year, after the United States. The Office for Budget Responsibility, part of the reason Ms. Reeves has to find so much more money, is the expectation that the Office for Budget Responsibility, which provides independent analyses of the economy, is going to lower its forecasts for the productivity growth of Britain from 1 percent a year. That would suggest the overall economy would grow more slowly, as well, and the debt burden of Britain would be harder to bring down, the economists at the Office for Budget Responsibility, who influence fiscal policy, are accepting that the future

might look less rosy Ms **Reeves could avoid raising income or other large taxes and try again for a more targeted approach focused for example on inheritance taxes or capital gains taxes** But that could backfire and risk the credibility of the government in the eyes of financial markets UK public finances are not on a sustainable footing and there needs to be some credible fiscal consolidation **Five years on from the pandemic now is the time to start thinking about bringing that debt ratio down**

**8 United Kingdom** **Economic policy is one thing Right Wing Reform UK head Nigel Farage cannot crib from the Trump playbook** Rafael Behr **The Guardian** November 5 2025 Nigel Farage outlines the Reform UK economic priorities at a press conference in the City of London November 3 2025 An Opinion on Nigel Farage **Economic policy is one thing Nigel Farage cannot crib from the Trump playbook** Rafael Behr Rafael Behr **The Maga model based on the exorbitant market privileges of the US cannot be imported to Britain That is going to be a problem for Reform UK** Nigel Farage loves a gamble In his 2015 memoir *The Purple Revolution* a whole chapter is dedicated to the Farage appetite for risk how he indulged it in the City and how that prepared him for a career in politics He boasts of the time he lost a seven figure sum of money in the course of a morning on the zinc market before breezing off to the pub He waxes nostalgic about the halcyon days of freewheeling finance before ghastly regulators spoiled the fun when terrible cock ups could be written off because decimal points and all those zeros can be tricky after a three hour lunch Farage the commodities trader was not a details guy Farage the politician is not famously punctilious either but the stakes are higher **He is backing himself to be prime minister and it is not going to happen if voters see him as the kind of gambler who might blow the nation's budget on a boozy bet** Dispelling that notion was the purpose of a speech by the Reform UK leader on Monday Farage disposed of the Reform UK 2024 election manifesto and its promise of tax cuts worth 90 billion pounds because it was a tissue of fiscal fantasy He observed that the sluggish growth and high debt of Britain demand sober management of public finances He hinted that Treasury savings could one day be made by unpicking the sacred triple lock that guarantees perpetual real terms rises in the state pension Liz Truss was not named but the new parsimonious Farage economics has been formulated to silence comparisons between the Reform UK agenda and the budget misadventure of the Tory prime minister Liz Truss whose unfunded tax giveaway incinerated the financial credibility of the nation It is the Nigel Farage chameleon show flashy ever changing pledges but only one real policy xenophobia By dabbling in macroeconomics Farage also wants to show that he has range He can also complain about the Bank of England too cautious over cryptocurrencies the Financial Conduct Authority captured by a diversity agenda public sector pensions a massive liability and net zero a burden on energy bills Europe cannot be the scapegoat it once was but **the old moan can be tuned anew to a post Brexit key** Farage is saying that the opportunity of deregulation from Brussels red tape has been squandered Killjoy regulators tame the animal spirits of the market The remedy is to slash disability benefits and use tax breaks to entice those non domiciles who have exiled themselves back from Dubai The fiscal details of how that might all add up the decimal points and zeros remain shrouded in post prandial haze The White House claims the budget will repair itself with money generated by newly stimulated growth That is also what Liz Truss said The bond market was not convinced Trump also thinks tariffs imposed on other countries will be a substitute for domestic tax revenue **He is wrong both conceptually and arithmetically** Tariffs are an import tax paid ultimately by US consumers not foreigners and the Treasury income hardly dents the deficit But for now the absurdity of it just hangs in the air defying economic gravity That trick is not available to a UK prime minister **Nor is The Trump habit of shaking down US corporate giants for equity and cash** If Reform so much as flirted with Trump economics in an election manifesto markets would convulse at every opinion poll putting it in the lead **Labor would correctly warn that a vote for Reform is a vote to bankrupt Britain**

Farage is a gambler not a fool. He knows he has to moderate his tone and get across some budget details. But attention to detail has never been his thing and **responsibility bores him**. Maybe he can win without it. He might fancy the odds on Labor continuing to flounder, the Tories failing to get their act together and that combination being enough to put him in Downing Street. And **yet it is revealing how vulnerable the Reform leader obviously feels on the economy**. His old script is stale and without the Maga playbook to crib from he really has nothing new to say and a long time to be exposed not saying it.

After feeding in the Alps all summer cows are escorted back to their farms to produce high quality milk that is used to make cheeses like Gruyère Emmentaler Tilsiter and Appenzeller. Gruyère makers are trying to make the most of a glum situation. With the price of gold near record highs and Switzerland a global hub for gold bars the industry has started a US marketing campaign to play off the higher prices. We are saying Gruyère is the new gold of Switzerland said Pierre Ivan Guyot president of the Gruyère Interprofessional Association. The hope is that American consumers will be willing to shell out for the luxury of real Gruyère rather than copies made elsewhere. After slashing exports in August producers sent more Gruyère to the United States in September ahead of the Christmas season. As for Swiss cows the farmers keep working toward a solution. We will try to do the least amount of slaughter possible he said. Then when we have passed the difficult period Switzerland can bounce back. The verdant hills of Switzerland have helped produce a bountiful milk harvest this year.

10 Germany      How Trade Tensions Sent Automakers Scrambling for Chips      Carmakers and their suppliers are piecing together new supply chains after a Chinese owned company in the Netherlands was caught in the middle of the trade war revealing European vulnerabilities. The Mercedes Benz headquarters in Stuttgart Germany. Mercedes Stellantis and Nissan have formed task forces to keep production running and secure alternative chip supplies. **Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization**      The New York Times      November 5 2025      Automakers around the world and their suppliers have begun scaling back production after a dispute over a Chinese owned chipmaker in the Netherlands led to a shortage of the semiconductors needed to power the systems in vehicles. Representatives from China and the European Union met on Tuesday in an effort to resolve the standoff more than a month after the Dutch government seized control of the chipmaker Nexperia. Beijing has halted deliveries of chips from its factories and criticized officials in the Netherlands for failing to work to find a resolution. Efforts from Washington to try to resolve the dispute have failed leaving more companies concerned they may be forced to halt production if a solution is not found soon. The car industry in Europe has been the most vocal but Nexperia makes thousands of chips used by other industries to make products like washing machines vacuum cleaners night vision devices radars and tanks. I think there are very justified concerns about global manufacturing output being impacted if this cannot be resolved in the next few weeks said Chris Miller author of the book Chip War who reports widely on the semiconductor industry. How did the chip dispute start? Nexperia which has headquarters in the Netherlands was bought by a Chinese company Wingtech in December 2019 and has since shipped basic but necessary chips to manufacturers around the world. In late September the Dutch government took control of the company over what it said were concerns that more production could be

moved to China from Europe. Documents from a court in Amsterdam showed that US officials had pressured the Dutch government about the ownership of the company. Beijing responded by stopping export of the chips that are packaged at the Nexperia factories there sending automakers around the globe scrambling to secure supplies and warning about disruptions. The White House announced on Saturday that as part of the trade deal between Trump and the Chinese leader Xi Jinping shipments from the Nexperia production sites in China would begin again. That has yet to happen. Some industry insiders have drawn parallels of the current situation to the shortages after economies around the world shut down during the coronavirus pandemic while others have pointed to a significant difference. This is a politically induced situation the chief executive of Mercedes Benz said on a call with analysts last week. Why cannot the chips just be replaced? Semiconductors require a twostep production process. In the Nexperia case the front end production takes place in Hamburg Germany while the back end production where the chips are completed and packaged is done mostly in China. To produce the chips in China Wingtech would have to find wafers that were made locally while Nexperia would need more options to finish the production outside China. The company already has some back end production in Malaysia and the Philippines but it is not enough to compensate for the loss of its Chinese sites. Nexperia has the financial stability to make this happen but it would take at least four to six months said a senior analyst at the Mercator Institute for China Studies in Berlin. On top of that the chips have to be tested and receive certification before they can be used in cars. In recent years analysts have warned that companies moving production to China should have a backup plan even if it means higher operating costs to strengthen and diversify supply chains in case of an emergency. This should be the latest wakeup call that anyone needs in terms of how far China is willing to go to protect its own companies. Which carmakers are affected? The necessity of the Nexperia chips is reflected in the span of automakers announcing plans to curtail production. Mercedes Stellantis and Nissan have set up task forces to help them figure out how to maintain production while securing chips from other sources. Bosch the largest auto parts supplier in Europe said the situation with Nexperia had presented major challenges that demanded flexibility. The company said that up to 1000 of its employees at two factories in Germany might have to scale back to part time work through a government supported program that was also used during the pandemic. We are using alternative sources of supply optimizing inventory levels in our global manufacturing network and implementing technical alternatives said a spokeswoman for Bosch. Nissan said on Wednesday that it would cut production at two plants in Japan because of the suspension of shipments from Nexperia.

In 1943 the Ukrainian born composer Thomas de Hartmann wrote a violin concerto that seemed to contain the heartbreak of an exile over the destruction of his homeland in World War II. He dedicated it to Albert Bloch a Jewish violinist living in hiding in the south of France. De Hartmann had fled Russia with his wife Olga years earlier as part of the inner circle surrounding the mystic George Ivanovich Gurdjieff. In 1929 the de Hartmanns took refuge in an abandoned house near Paris that fortuitously had a piano. There the composer began to find his own voice again. In the Violin Concerto he poured both anguish and vitality into a score that would be performed in 1947 and then forgotten packed away like a suitcase of a refugee heavy with memories of an unrecoverable past until decades later it was

found by the star violinist Joshua Bell. Already poignant, the concerto took on even more meaning in the Bell and Stasevska recording because of the circumstances under which it was made. The project could not be done in Lviv, Ukraine, where the orchestra is based with the frequent air raid alarms that have sent people running for shelter. Instead, the INSO Lviv Orchestra traveled to Warsaw for the recording, which required special government permission for the male players to leave Ukraine during wartime. It was very meaningful for the musicians, Stasevska said. After hundreds of years of oppression, Ukrainians are now going through the very difficult de-imperialization of their minds and history. They are discovering who they are, what their culture is, and what the music is that has been forbidden, destroyed, or not published, she added. So in a way, we are all together on this journey.
