2 California Oakland Coal Shipping Activism against Coal Shipping began from a story in a Utah Newspaper A Stand Against Coal Could Push Oakland Toward Bankruptcy After Oakland Calif reneged on a contract allowing coal shipments a Kentucky company went under Courts say the city must now pay hundreds of millions of dollars Port activities have long been a driver of the Oakland economy but the city ultimately tried to block a plan to ship coal from its terminal **Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization** The New York Times November 24 2025 It could turn out to be the costliest story ever written in a Utah weekly newspaper In April 2015 the Richfield Reaper covered a new initiative to export Utah coal through a port in Oakland California and across the Pacific Ocean The story found its way to Bay Area environmentalists who quickly circulated the piece and were outraged that the Oakland waterfront could become a conduit for shipping fossil fuels overseas What followed was a decade long political and legal saga that ultimately could push the struggling City of Oakland toward bankruptcy Port activities have long been a driver of the Oakland economy Oakland has 444000 residents and has the ninth busiest port in the

United States which unloads containers from Asia and ships American cargo across the Pacific. The Oakland seaport activities also have been a draw for progressive activists given that the port serves as the East Bay link to the world. A decade ago when environmental protesters banded together and convinced the city to renege on a contract allowing coal shipments from an Oakland terminal it set off a chain of events that undermined a Kentucky coal company and left the city potentially liable for hundreds of millions of dollars. Since then judges have ruled multiple times against Oakland. In 2013 Oakland authorized a local developer Phil Tagami to build a 250 million dollar shipping terminal. Tagami made a contract to ship coal. No Coal in Oakland a grass roots organization was formed to fight the shipping terminal. Local activists and environmental groups including the Sierra Club and Earthjustice lobbied the Oakland City Council to stop coal from entering the city. Hundreds of No Coal demonstrators showed up to City Council meetings. **Though coal would not be burned in Oakland toxic dust can be created when pieces jostle against each other such as in a rail car or when conveyed onto a ship. Environmentalists were adamantly opposed to Oakland contributing to the use of more fossil fuels which release greenhouse gas emissions that worsen climate change.** City officials had already approved a contract to export bulk commodities from the terminal and nowhere did it say coal was prohibited. Last month a Bankruptcy Judge of the Western District of Kentucky ruled that the Oakland improper and unjustified conduct significantly disrupted and burdened the Kentucky based company that had been contracted to ship coal out of the Oakland terminal forcing it into bankruptcy. The judge suggested the damages were between 654 million dollars before interest what the coal company is pushing for and 230 million dollars what an expert for the city of Oakland estimated the coal company had lost. A federal district judge is reviewing the ruling and the city is urging him to reject it. A professor at University of California College of the Law San Francisco said that if Oakland must pay damages it could likely do so in installments over a decade because it is a municipality. It could raise taxes or issue bonds paying interest to plaintiffs and bondholders but neither might be possible because the city has so little cash. Oakland has struggled with a yawning budget deficit since the pandemic and the City Council recently approved cuts in a two year budget to close a 265 million dollar gap. Still environmentalists said that they and city leaders were right to fight the coal project. Anyone who understands the risks of climate change as well as coal related air pollution cannot in their right mind want to ship and then burn so much coal a spokesperson said. Tagami said he expects cargo ships could depart from Oakland as soon as 2027 carrying coal overseas.

In a struggling area of Lincoln a program pays for repairs and energy efficiency upgrades in rental buildings. In return landlords must keep rents affordable. When a retired history teacher who owns rental properties throughout Lincoln Nebraska bought the troubled Regent apartments in 2021 his main concern was the quality of life. The Regent was nearly a century old. The address was the subject of hundreds of 911 calls. Crime was spilling over. So he applied to a special city program that provides grants to help pay for building improvements in exchange for his promise to keep rents affordable. The Regent got new plumbing and sewer lines among other repairs and the 911 calls plummeted. [Its makeover also helped the climate. Fifty three electric heat pumps the most energy efficient way to heat and cool homes were recently installed replacing energy hungry electric window heating and cooling units that often failed](#) the city of Lincoln has helped weatherize and repair many buildings since 2023 as part of a program to rehabilitate decrepit buildings and improve their energy efficiency without pricing out tenants. The building owner of the Regent also used the program for upgrades at the Palisades next door which [now has 40 heat pumps one for each apartment](#). According to the energy services manager at the Lincoln Electric System [the heat pumps cut the Pannual carbon emissions of the Palisades building by 176000 pounds thanks to reduced energy use and electric bills at the building dropped by an average of 260 dollars per unit a year](#). A woman with a cat who currently receives disability benefits pays 720 dollars monthly in rent and said similar apartments elsewhere in Lincoln cost 1100 dollars. Her monthly electric bill is 60 dollars. The rental rehab program part of the Lincoln climate action plan covers buildings in a historic low income neighborhood called South of Downtown. About 96 percent of residents there are renters often living in substandard housing. The city wanted to save the buildings reduce their energy consumption and lower tenant utility bills. Tenants were worried that fixes would lead to unaffordable rents yet both they and their landlords shared many of the same complaints. Tenants were telling us their units were not airtight said the Lincoln chief sustainability officer. They were not insulated well enough. They were cold they were hot. And the landlords were telling us that they did not have the money to upgrade the units. The Lincoln director of urban development devised a plan. The city could use a tool tax increment financing [to put future tax payments from building owners into a special fund that would help pay for repairs](#). Landlords would get grants of up to 15 thousand dollars per unit for things like new windows insulation foundation repairs and roofs [along with access to incentives for heat pumps](#). In exchange for the grants landlords had to accept federal Section 8 housing vouchers. And while rents could be raised after the repairs they had to be kept below the federal government fair market rate for a number of years currently 20. When the program began city officials were not sure if there would be any interest. But within the first year 300 applications from landlords poured in requiring officials to create a wait list said the Lincoln urban development manager. The city said it was on track to meet its goal of rehabilitating 1 thousand units within a decade. And as part of the program [180 heat pumps have so far been installed](#) along with other energy efficiency upgrades [including heat pump water heaters](#). At several rehabbed buildings in the area residents

said they now had reliable air conditioning and heat and new windows that kept out icy air and snow. The executive director of NeighborWorks Lincoln a nonprofit that helps administer the program said he had initially feared that the program would result in much higher rents but his concerns soon subsided. Tenants were in updated more efficient apartments. **Property owners were making improvements that otherwise would not have been made.** And the city was making a huge investment in the area. According to the city rents for units rehabilitated during the first year of the program were on average 250 dollars below the federally set fair market rent. Last year the city added a requirement that rents below the fair market rate cannot be raised more than 5 percent. We make refinements as we learn.

The 30th conference of the parties Cop30 the annual climate summit of all nations party to the UNFCCC just ended. The conference was a failure. Its outcome the decision text known as the Global Mutirão or Global Collective Effort is in essence a form of climate denial. In 2023 the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change IPCC determined that the world had already developed or planned to develop too much fossil fuel to be able to halt global heating at 2C. It acknowledged that the capital assets built up around fossil fuels must be stranded abandoned and not used if warming was to be limited to 2C. But the Cop30 decision text ignores all this. Indeed it never even mentions fossil fuels. This failure is all the more bitter because Cop30 had initially sent out so many hopeful signals that it would finally tackle the transitioning away from fossil fuels pledge from Cop28. China did not block the text on the roadmap to fossil fuel phaseout but neither did it fight to make sure it was included. One bright spot of Cop30 is that Colombia and the Netherlands backed by 22 nations will independently advance a roadmap to fossil fuel phaseout beginning with a conference in April 2026. This conference could be a gamechanger. UN rules require all Cop decision texts to be approved unanimously giving the petrostates veto power over global climate politics. **The creation of a fossil fuel roadmap outside the Cop process may establish a trading bloc that could begin to sanction nations and banks that refuse to wind down fossil fuels** Such a bloc will have no power if its leaders are not forced to resolve their ambivalence about phasing out fossil fuels. And that is where you and I come in. All of us must do our part and subject world leaders to extreme and relentless public pressure. The challenge of stranding potentially trillions of dollars in fossil capital and rebuilding the world is enormous. Of course global leaders and officials will take the easier cowardly road if they can get away with it. As we cross the 1 point 5C threshold into uncharted climatic territory we must make them fight wholeheartedly for fossil fuel phaseout. In the end it is up to us to create a global politics that will finally save the world for our children.

over critical global issues like Trump US opposition to clean energy and **renewable energy and the US has great influence because of Trump trade and Trump potential wars** and Trump lack of support for the Ukraine war against Russian aggression **Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization** The New York Times November 23 2025 President Cyril Ramaphosa of South Africa could not contain his laughter A reporter asked him to confirm reports that the United States had dropped its boycott and asked to participate in the Group of 20 summit in Johannesburg just two days before it was set to start The South African leader barely uttered a word before breaking down in laughter eventually composing himself and saying he had received a note from the Americans about a change of mind Earlier the subsequent scolding from the White House would have set off slight panic in the South African government and perhaps drawn an explanation from Mister Ramaphosa for his departure from diplomatic decorum But with Trump boycotting the annual meeting over his contention that South Africa is persecuting its white minority some countries were taking a tougher tone on the United States the largest economy in the world and trying to show that life can go on That meant shaking hands signing deals deepening alliances and making pledges at slickly produced live events The G20 should send a clear message that the world can move on with or without the US Ronald Lamola the South Africa foreign minister said at a forum hosted by Bloomberg before the summit We will mark them absent and continue with the business South Africa declined a Trump administration request that Mister Ramaphosa ceremonially hand over the summit to the acting ambassador for the United States which hosts next the 2026 G20 Ramaphosa would not hand over to a junior diplomat the government said adding that American officials could instead come by its foreign ministry later in the week for the handover At the summit Mister Ramaphosa pushed ahead with an agenda that put African interests at the fore He broke with tradition by starting the two day meeting with the adoption of a final declaration such documents are normally issued at the end And he said that the declaration had unanimous agreement among the members present despite an objection from the foreign minister of Argentina That country several participants said has championed the Trump interests in 2025 We note with deep respect the views expressed by Argentina Mister Ramaphosa responded We will with great respect move ahead with the accepted declaration as the G20 The final declaration included many terms that Trump officials had opposed in meetings ahead of the summit among them **just energy transitions climate change and gender equality** I think the big message coming out of this G20 is that despite the geopolitical bullying that exists despite the power of the US that countries can come together and still get stuff done said Nabil Ahmed a senior director at Oxfam America who attended the summit President Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva of Brazil told reporters after the meeting ended on Sunday that although Mister Trump has been promoting unilateralism I think multilateralism will win But Lula and his fellow leaders are under no illusion that they can simply thumb their noses at Trump The size of its economy means that the United States still has great influence over critical global issues like **renewable energy trade and wars** Brazil is still grappling with high tariffs Washington imposed South Africa is in the middle of difficult negotiations with the Trump administration to try to get its own 30 percent tariff reduced And the final G20 declaration is not binding but it can influence the policy decisions of International Monetary Fund On the first day of the summit when Ukrainian allies quickly had to pull together a meeting on the sidelines to discuss a contentious American backed peace plan for the war with Russia In some ways the Trump America retreat has allowed other nations to look past their problems with each other The European leaders announced a new minerals pact with South Africa and pledged billions of dollars toward renewable energy development in Africa We are a partner that plays by the rules European Union President Ursula von der Leyen said We listen to our partners
