and California Los Angeles Once a Gamble in the Desert Electric Grid Batteries Are Everywhere An early grid battery was installed in the Atacama Desert in Chile 15 years ago Now as prices have tumbled they are increasingly being used around the world Photo of Andes Solar IV one of the largest solar farms in Chile The rapid growth of renewable energy is among the factors making batteries a necessity Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization The New York Times December 5 2025 American researchers invented the lithium ion battery in the 1970s and later showed that the devices could help the electric grid But for a long time batteries made little headway because grid managers and utility executives dismissed them as expensive and risky One of the first breakthroughs came about 15 years ago when engineers at a US energy company installed one of the first lithium ion batteries tied to a grid in a desert nearly 9000 feet above sea level in Chile Challenging conventional notions of how the electricity system should be run that team helped prove that batteries could help make electric grids more stable and reliable The concept of storing energy was not new Thomas Edison developed alkaline nickel iron batteries largely for industry and early electric vehicles Various companies tried other technologies like sodium sulfur which have not gained much traction And some utilities have long pumped water uphill so that later it could be sent back down to generate electricity But those systems were relatively limited The kinds of lithium batteries installed in the Atacama Desert in 2009 by comparison are now being used around the world The batteries soak up power from the solar farm which is in the Atacama Desert The rapid growth of wind and solar power and the rising demand for electricity from data centers are making batteries a necessity They store surplus renewable energy for when it is not windy or sunny and maintain a balance between energy supply and demand Consider California In recent years state officials have often asked residents to use less electricity on hot summer days to prevent power outages But there have been no such alerts since 2022 largely because batteries have allowed California to use its abundant solar power well into the evening Over the last seven years California added 30 times as much battery storage capacity as it had in 2018 The rest of the world has also seen impressive growth according to the International Energy Agency a multilateral organization in Paris The boom was made possible by a stunning 90 percent drop in the cost of batteries over the last 15 years as new factories have come on line China is by far the largest battery manufacturer in the world but Europe India and the United States have recently been increasing production too Batteries are changing the game before our eyes the executive director of the

International Energy Agency said recently The batteries some as large as shipping containers are now being used for energy storage in pretty much every country Earlier some Americans clearly saw the benefits of batteries One of them was an executive at AES which owns utilities and power plants across the world He began to look into lithium ion batteries when his bosses asked employees to pitch proposals for a billion dollar idea he thought batteries could reduce the need for power plants that utilities used only when electricity demand climbed to peak levels Why would you build an asset that you were not going to use more than 5 percent of the time? Shelton said We were saying batteries should be an alternative to peaker plants He first installed battery cells at a nondescript electricity substation outside Indianapolis Indiana a city known for its 500 mile car race His company later connected one in Norristown Pennsylvania at an operations center of the largest grid manager PJM Interconnection in the US The Los Angeles area was connected next followed by a larger battery for the Indianapolis grid While his tests were successful they did not sufficiently impress many American utility executives The reaction was typical of an industry that prides itself for sticking with what it knows best — large coal gas and nuclear power plants Anything else has generally been treated as a threat that may cause blackouts Even now US utilities in many states are reluctant to add batteries A lot fewer large batteries are being added in the Southeast for example than in California and Texas Utility executives are not the only ones who are skeptical So are policymakers and many ordinary Americans Some local governments have banned big batteries because of safety concerns In May and June a large battery complex in Monterey County Calif was destroyed in a fire that spewed smoke and harmful chemicals Despite that disaster energy experts say many risks have been addressed The California fire happened in a type of battery that most companies no longer use And those batteries were installed in a power plant building where the fire easily spread from device to device Most batteries are installed outdoors to reduce the chances that fires spread In Chile which has no domestic fuel sources with too little energy for its people and its copper iodine and lithium mines Chile was forced to rely on power plants that burned expensive imported coal But those plants could not be easily turned up or down and the needs of the Chile mining companies fluctuated a lot That was where the batteries came in While it can take a coal plant about 12 minutes to get going batteries can discharge power almost instantly By pairing the two engineers realized that batteries could deliver the electricity that mines needed while coal plants fired up The man worked 16 hour days for six months to connect the first commercialized lithium battery to an electric grid That device still stands though most of its tasks have been taken over by newer more efficient and affordable units The project was immediately successful helping keep the electricity system stable when mining operations caused surges that had previously led to grid failures and outages AES executives back in the United States kept close track of what was happening in Chile And in 2010 the company installed commercial battery systems in New York and Texas Two years later AES began adding more batteries in Chile including next to big solar farms the last decade batteries have helped Chile use less coal Last December the country got more than 40 percent of its electricity from solar panels and wind turbines up from 19 percent five years earlier according to Ember Energy Research a nonprofit Australia Britain China India and other countries have also been adding lots of renewable energy and batteries The man said that even he had been surprised by the recent rapid growth of batteries We under predicted how far the prices would fall

Trump has long portrayed European allies as freeloaders that fail to pay enough for their own security and argued that the European Union was formed to screw the United States. Now that hostility is official White House policy. The Trump administration issued a national security strategy paper this week that called for European nations to take primary responsibility for their own defense indicating that the United States should no longer guarantee European security. It accused the European Union of stifling political liberty warned that some NATO members risked becoming a no longer European majority and said the US should align with patriotic European parties code for the far right movements of Europe. For many parents rapidly changing recommendations around vaccines have added a layer of anxiety in navigating what is typically a stressful time with a new baby at home. New moms said the shifting health advice from the Trump administration has made an already seemingly endless number of decisions feel even more daunting. On Friday a federal vaccine committee at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention voted to end a decades old recommendation that all newborns be immunized at birth against hepatitis B a highly infectious virus that can cause severe liver damage. Meanwhile a lawyer who has made a living suing vaccine manufacturers lectured the committee for literal hours. I do not know this definitively but it certainly must have been the longest presentation any individual has ever given at an ACIP meeting. Unfortunately it was full of mischaracterized data often aimed at FDA approval of vaccines with established records of safety and effectiveness. While we would expect this from RFK Junior allies what is new is that someone like this was given an enormous platform to spread this garbage. Of course the large irony on conflicts of interest was not lost on observers with functioning brains. Secretary RFK Junior fired all seventeen genuine experts from the committee this summer by claiming despite evidence to the contrary that the incumbent panelists had too many conflicts of interest. Now the committee has to hear a lawyer who makes his living suing vaccine manufacturers pontificate for hours. Aluminum foil hat. We heard two presentations that implied that aluminum exposure due to vaccines are problematic for kids. Aluminum is added to stimulate immune responses from vaccines the idea is that if we are going to vaccinate people the shots should work. That is a talking point against vaccination that has been roundly debunked over and over. But Secretary RFK Junior will not let it go he had a public meltdown about a recent study that went against his beliefs and I expect to see him weaponize terrible science on this to advance his agenda against vaccines while ignoring mountains of high quality data regarding their safety. In the end the committee voted to move America back to before 1991 by **removing the universal vaccination recommendation for the Hepatitis B infant dose despite no new evidence of harm and ignoring clear benefits**. They also recommended that parents ask clinicians for an antibody blood test to determine the need for subsequent doses even though there is no evidence that this works. This ultimately **shifts the burden to clinicians and parents**. **If confusion dominates headlines and clinical practice and falsehoods fill the void the consequences will be serious**. **But if we respond the way we saw many do today pushing back with clarity authority evidence coordination and grassroots strength the harm can be contained and minimized**. **The Evidence Collective TEC counted more than 60 we lost count after this falsehoods distortions and outright lies** being megaphoned from one of the highest committees in the US. Potential damage from that alone is staggering. The TEC debunk report is [HERE](#). It was truly a herculean effort. However there were also decisions made on your behalf. Two recommendations passed. **Vote 1 translation** If the mother is Hep B positive get the birth dose. If Hep B status is unknown get the birth dose. **If Hep B negative shared clinical decision making about the birth dose**. **If the patient chooses to delay then delay for at least 2 months**. **Interpretation** This changes the universal birth dose recommendation to a **risk based one reverting us to pre 1991**. **This decision was not evidence based**. Hep B vaccine has one of the most well established safety records of any vaccine. During the meeting decades of favorable risk/benefit priorities were replaced by pseudoscience baseless skepticism and decisions were not made by experts. **Implications** **We can expect to see hundreds of babies in the next decade who would otherwise not have contracted deadly chronic liver disease because of this change**. **Importantly** If you do want a vaccine at birth even if you do not test positive you still can and should get it and **will be covered by insurance**. **Vote 2 translation** Parents can ask their clinicians whether to get an antibody blood test before Hep B vaccine doses 2 and or 3. **Interpretation** As written the recommendation is deeply confusing. The biggest issue **scientists do not know what antibody level guarantees long term protection for babies** especially after just one dose. So the test cannot reliably tell families whether their child is actually protected. **Implications** Using a blood test to decide on Hep B vaccination means **another infant blood draw another appointment and added costs for the health system and potentially for families**. And while the recommendation **suggests insurers should cover this testing** ACIP has no authority over anything beyond immunization policy. There is also a practical concern **skipping Hep B doses 2 and 3 could disrupt how other routine infant vaccines are given since many are bundled together like DTaP and Hib**. **Under immunized babies are at higher risk for preventable chronic liver disease**. **Importantly** You can choose the standard 3 dose Hep B infant series and be confident that your baby is protected without any extra blood draws. There will be increasing confusion about evidence based vaccination options for parents clinicians hospital systems and schools. **This will decrease vaccination coverage leading to more disease and unnecessary suffering**. Use your networks and voices to make sure new parents and clinicians are empowered to make evidence informed decisions. Why this did not become catastrophic and what gives me hope As a nation we should strive for excellence but the **votes could have been even worse**. **The committee seriously considered removing the Hep B vaccine altogether or delaying it until the teen years**. That did not happen not because of this panel or the so called gold standard evidence but because **people both inside and outside the room refused to let ideology steamroll the health of infants**. **Individuals spoke up within ACIP** There were two ACIP members Meissner and Hibbeln who pushed back hard on the unbalanced

presentation of science the unseriousness of the presentations and the ridiculousness of the votes

There were so many statements that I disagree with it is hard to be succinct Meissner said I am thankful they were there

CDC scientists working under impossible conditions were not allowed in the room to present evidence yet coordinated behind the scenes to protect the science Bottom line The United States took a step backward in vaccine policy today which will have implications ranging from confusion to preventable liver disease and deaths

While the headlines have focused on how European allies must end mass migration and elect patriotic parties or face civilizational erasure what is most striking about the 33 page document is what it ignores Russia is mentioned in only four paragraphs and never in tones of condemnation for its invasion of a neighboring state leading to a war that has produced more than 1 point 5 million casualties Instead it portrays the United States as something of a neutral negotiator that can diminish tensions between Russia and Europe and reestablish strategic stability with Moscow The discussion of Europe and civilizational extinction seems drawn from the speech Vice President JD Vance delivered at the Munich Security Conference in February But the caution about China appears to have come from the Treasury and from Trump himself who has said he is looking forward to visiting Beijing in April to strike even larger trade deals
