1 Alabama A College Freshman Is the Unlikely Source of New Political Maps for Alabama A college freshman drew the maps to determine who will represent State Senate Districts 25 and 26 in Alabama Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization The New York Times December 26 2025 A college freshman got to work while attending the University of Alabama He set out to create new legislative maps for State Senate Districts 25 and 26 in Alabama A legal fight over those districts in Montgomery Ala had been brewing since 2021 when plaintiffs filed a lawsuit arguing that state officials had violated Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act and created maps that effectively diluted the power of Black voters In October a federal judge ordered that those districts be redrawn and invited the public to submit maps for consideration It was widely expected that the selected map would come from the team that had redrawn the Alabama congressional districts in 2023 which included a cartographer Enter the 19 year old political science major who was born in Alaska raised in rural Alabama and obsessed since high school with redistricting He sent in six maps in October and carried on with his college education in Tuscaloosa Alabama periodically checking the court docket online in the weeks after One morning in November he received a text from a friend with a link to an article about the map that had just been selected It was one of his Three hundred thousand Alabamians will be voting under some new districting lines that I redrew in my college dorm room at 3 in the morning he said in an interview It is surreal The outcome shocked political enthusiasts in Alabama as well as close observers of redistricting efforts across the country Those efforts which normally take place near the start of each decade were thrust into the limelight this year after President Trump set off a redistricting arms race by asking Texas Republicans to find five additional seats for their party California quickly moved to redraw

its maps and other states have joined the partisan battle for supremacy in the 2026 midterm elections. The student is a Democrat but he emphasized that he did not allow partisanship to influence his mapmaking. Around 2023 he started a debate team at his high school in Russell County, Alabama. When he was 16 he began creating election maps for fun. He drew precinct maps for the 2024 primary election for the Alabama newly redrawn congressional district. He drew some state legislative maps right down to the precinct for Alaska. He had been following the legal fight over the Montgomery State Senate redistricting since it started in 2021 when he was 14. He used a free online app called Redistricting of Dave to help draw the lines for Alabama. Now it is likely his map will be the one used in the 2026 election though an appeal is pending. A lawyer with the American Civil Liberties Union said that the plaintiffs objected to the map made by the student because the remedy did not create enough opportunities for Black voters to elect Black candidates. In their analysis of past election results in one of the districts proposed by the student, data showed that Black candidates would often lose and white candidates nearly always won. The ACLU has not yet decided whether it will appeal. The student said his map followed the guidelines that had been ordered by the judge. I got to be part of the decades-long fight for civil rights, he said, for people of color in the Deep South.

The New York Times December 26, 2025. A father named LB does not like to leave the house with his 2-year-old son EB. That is because their home in Miami, Arizona, is downhill from an industrial facility that is one of the largest sources in the US of pollution containing lead, a powerful neurotoxin that can harm the health of children. I have a toddler and I am not putting him outside in that, LB, aged 29, said. So we stay inside for days, sometimes. The facility, one of only two remaining copper smelters in the country, processes copper for use in electronics, construction materials, and a range of other products. Under rules put in place by the Biden administration, the owner of the facility, Freeport-McMoRan, would have been required to install technology to reduce its toxic emissions. But in October, Trump exempted the smelter from complying with limits on lead, arsenic, chromium, and other hazardous pollutants for the next two years. Freeport did not have to present an exhaustive argument for why it deserved a reprieve. There was no economic analysis or engineering study. It was as easy as sending an email to the Environmental Protection Agency where a senior official provided guidance to a lawyer for the company, according to emails and documents. It is one of many efforts by the Trump administration to weaken or waive environmental protections that companies view as overly burdensome. In the past year, the administration has proposed rolling back more than a dozen regulations governing air pollution, water contamination, and planet-warming greenhouse gas emissions. In Gila County, which includes Miami, more than two-thirds of voters supported Trump in the 2024 election. Many liberal residents voiced more concern about the exemption than their conservative counterparts. JP, a 75-year-old retired machinist who considers himself a moderate Democrat, said he worried about the effects of breathing in the emissions from the smelter. The air here is bad enough as it is, said JP, who has battled prostate cancer for the past decade. But IA, aged 84, a volunteer for a local church and a staunch Republican, said she was unbothered by the Trump proclamation. He is doing a lot of strange things, but I voted for him, and I am still for him, she said. Ms. IA, who can see the smelter from her front windows, said the air quality had improved since she was growing up in Miami. Back then, she said, a sulfurous smog hung in the air, leaving the taste of rotten eggs in her mouth. The smog cleared after Freeport installed equipment to capture its sulfur dioxide emissions, she said. The smelter has still not installed the additional baghouse to capture more emissions of lead. High levels of exposure to lead in childhood can result in stomach pain, vomiting, fatigue, learning difficulties, developmental delays, and seizures. While the most common source of exposure is paint in older homes, lead from industrial facilities like smelters can also accumulate in soil, research shows. Mister ES, an environmental health specialist at the Gila County health department, gets

a phone call about once a month from a parent whose child was poisoned by lead he said. But there is little data on the problem he said since few parents have the blood of their children tested for lead. And when the county recently offered free testing for contaminants in well water no one signed up said Mister JB the director of the department of public health and community services. It is a mining community and they just do not believe that these things are bad for them or they do not want to believe it he said. Tests to Come More data on the health effects of the smelter could be available soon. In July a contractor for Freeport began notifying residents of free testing for arsenic lead and copper in the soil on their properties. After the contractor has collected and analyzed samples it will remove and replace any contaminated soil. It is unclear how long that process will take. But several residents said they were anxiously awaiting the results. I tried planting rose bushes but nothing survives in this dirt said Ms SY a 46 year old public health educator and journalist who has lived in the area for her entire life. Since we were kids the sunsets over the smelter have been really pretty orange colors. But imagine what they are spewing into the air that we cannot see. Mister LB the father of the 2 year old said he hopes to have moved by the time the results are ready.

Richvale California population 234 sits hundreds of miles north from the tech hubs and balmy beaches of California. The almond growers and cattle ranchers here take turns volunteering as firefighters. Their entire region is likely to lose its Republican congressman and have him replaced by a Democrat after the 2026 midterm elections. People in the cities do not have a clue what it takes to survive out here said a 75 year old rice and walnut farmer who moved to Richvale in 1974. I do not think people that were born and raised in the cities can represent us to the same extent. The 26 thousand square mile First Congressional District currently stretches from the forested Oregon border to the Sacramento Valley breadbasket where farmers grow tomatoes walnuts peaches and billions of pounds of rice. The new map splits those voters into different districts. In what remains of the First Congressional District part of the Sacramento Valley is now combined with a strip of Wine Country liberals north of San Francisco who prognosticators estimate will turn this seat blue next year. Soon after voters passed the redistricting measure in November Mike McGuire a Democrat and former State Senate president pro tem from the wine region said he would run in that redrawn district. Somebody from Santa Rosa Oakland they are not going to understand and they are going to take the time to get educated about what is going on up here said a 62

year old retired Navy officer drinking in the last remaining bar in California where patrons stand instead of sit on stools We have got different needs than the people in the dense cities and the coast To relate to their northern neighbors who farm crops the drinking man imagined that Wine Country Democrats like McGuire might point out that they grow grapes in their region The beer drinking man said it is not the same thing

5 Myanmar Civil War Pushes Infectious Disease Over Its Borders Fighting has caused the spread of illnesses like malaria and cholera In a worst case scenario the situation could threaten regional health security experts say Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization The New York Times December 26 2025 The nurse has been working over 10 years but had never seen a case of diphtheria a potentially fatal disease This volunteer nurse from Myanmar recently found a toddler with diphtheria a potentially fatal disease The Myanmar border is so close to the Mae Tao Clinic that sometimes medical staff can hear the artillery and see smoke billowing in the sky Doctors there say they are trying to handle as many patients as they can to reduce the burden on the Thai health system On bad days that can mean treating double the number of the sick than before the war The Myanmar health care system has been hollowed out over decades by juntas that prioritized weapons over health budgets While there was some progress on disease control during a civilian government that was reversed when the military took back power in 2021 Myanmar is among the countries with the largest number of children who have never been vaccinated according to UNICEF Preventable diseases such as whooping cough and diphtheria have been on the rise according to doctors working in Myanmar The military is even targeting the health care system The World Health Organization has documented 67 military attacks on health facilities this year An airstrike on a 300 bed hospital in a rebel stronghold near the Myanmar border with Bangladesh killed at least 34 people this month The Shoklo Malaria Research Unit operates tuberculosis and malaria clinics along the Thailand–Myanmar border If Thailand did not control the situation we would be dying here said one of four Burmese doctors at Maesot General Hospital who used to be posted around the world for Doctors Without Borders long ago she treated a cook who was working in a scam center for tuberculosis If this man decides to go back home to Nepal he might infect everybody on the plane with TB she said In the wake of the 2021 coup a doctor was working on the Indian side of the border with Myanmar The more the conflict escalated the more HIV and TB patients she had to treat A dentist was running their hospital What can he do? she said In a

settlement of bamboo cabins among mango and jackfruit trees A 21 year old man is counting the days until he can continue the education he came to Thailand for He is quarantining with dozens of other Burmese tuberculosis patients at the so called TB village a clinic run by the Shoklo Malaria Research Unit The facility is reachable only by dirt roads tucked away from fearful Thai communities The 21 year old man says he is grateful to be here In Myanmar I could not get treatment like this he said

We asked Sam Rodriques a scientist turned technologist who is developing AI tools for scientific research through his nonprofit Future House and a for profit spinoff Edison Scientific Edison recently released Kosmos an AI agent or AI scientist to use the language of the company that it says can accomplish six months of doctoral or postdoctoral level research in a single 12 hour run Tools like it could dramatically speed up data analysis But claims about AI curing disease are unrealistic and bottlenecks still stand in the way of a true AI accelerated future 2026 is going to be the year when we see these agents start to infiltrate labs and infiltrate the normal lives of people It is already happening
