Wood Burning Fire Risk from High Winds

Colorado Faces Dire Warnings as High Winds Raise Fire Risk Emergency authorities across the region urged people to stay home and a utility company cut off power to 100000 of its customers near Denver Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization The New York Times December 19 2025 A utility company shut off power to more than 1 hundred thousand of its customers around Denver early Friday morning after the National Weather Service issued a dire warning that parts of Colorado Wyoming and Nebraska faced a dangerously high risk of wildfires through the day The Weather Service said the Friday weather conditions a potent combination of wind gusts reaching 100 miles per hour and relative humidity levels in the teens would create a particularly dangerous situation increasing the odds for rapidly spreading wildfires as dangerous winds shoot down mountainsides Map Data is not available for Alaska and Hawaii A particularly dangerous situation designation is a type of warning that the Weather Service uses only rarely when especially extreme conditions are forecast The warnings have traditionally been used primarily for tornado threats but in recent years the Weather Service has begun using them for fires as well One was issued in Los Angeles before devastating wildfires killed more than 30 people in January and also for parts of the South in the spring before tornadoes left at least two dozen people dead Forecasters in Colorado said the Friday warning was the first time they had issued one for fires in the state The fire risk on Friday was spread across a large portion of the Great Plains but the greatest threat fell within an area of southeastern Wyoming western Nebraska and northeastern Colorado with the most extreme conditions between Cheyenne and Boulder The most severe conditions were expected into the afternoon and evening

And when their regular restaurants began to close, they met in a nearby apartment and then another and another. For 82 years, they spoke German together virtually every week until last Saturday when the Oskar Maria Graf Stammtisch finally decided to disband. This coda was shared by nine people in the Upper Manhattan apartment of Thomas Strasser around 20 others Zoomed in from abroad.

Morgan McSweeney should not be a TikTok sensation. The algorithms do not reward lectures on the finer points of medical science. They do not elevate fact checkers over misinformation. And they generally do not make stars out of earnest goofballs in button-downs and Clark Kent glasses. But Doctor Noc, as he is known on TikTok and Instagram, has built an audience of more than four million followers anyway. With a style somewhere between a high school chemistry teacher and a youth minister, he has made a name for himself with silly dances and vaccine explainers. He is sort of like a new Bill Nye, said the director of the University of Connecticut Center for Health and Social Media. He threads the needle to be credible but engaging and informative. Dr. McSweeney, 33, who has a PhD in immunology and a day job in biotech, started posting short, sometimes awkward, science videos during the pandemic to beat lockdown boredom. He soon found a more serious niche: answering questions about the coronavirus. In his lectures, Doctor McSweeney will often walk through scientific papers, talking to viewers like they are students in a seminar. He follows social media conventions like split screens and jump cuts. But the material can be demanding. The truth is boring and nuanced and takes a long time to say, Doctor McSweeney said. So you have to figure out strategies in the first half a second, five seconds to kind of make it entertaining. One day in late November, he sat down to write a script after putting his baby daughter to bed. He knew he wanted to discuss changes to a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention webpage that had previously denied a link between vaccines and autism. The agency was now planning to examine that conclusion again. At first, I did not think it was real, Doctor McSweeney recalled. Could the CDC really be echoing what looked to him like vaccine misinformation? He focused on a 2010 paper cited on the page which suggested that newborns who got a hepatitis B vaccine in the first month were three times more likely to develop autism than those who did not. That night, he reminded himself to keep an open mind as he pulled up the study. It took just a couple of minutes to find what looked like a red flag and his hook. His opening betrayed a deep-seated anger. They are lying to us, the resulting video began. They are lying about our health, they are lying about our children. Then he went into professor mode, highlighting passages and pulling up a key data table. The sample included just 33 children with autism, he said, nine of whom had been vaccinated as newborns. That was too small a study to hang health policy on, he said. For comparison, he pointed to a Danish study that upheld the safety of a wider group of childhood vaccines this year and included about 12,000 children who had autism out of 1.2 million children total. The Health and Human Services agency has defended the changes to the website, calling them part of a comprehensive assessment of the causes of autism. The video continued for six minutes, far longer than the standard creator rules of thumb. To date, it has been viewed more than four million times. The Scientist and the Influencer. But he saw in the comments that some viewers were insulted. They came to him for answers, not to feel stupid. Of course, some of his commenters are more aggressive. Some call him a biotech shill or ominously say he will pay the price and get what is coming, he said. The blowback was more intense during the pandemic, he added, but also easier to shrug off before he was a father. Doctor McSweeney lives in North Carolina and works for a startup founded by one of his old professors that is developing therapies for respiratory infections. About half his income comes from social media, he said, reading ads for dog food or allergy medication. It gives him a deep sense of pride that so many people look to him for health advice. But it also troubles him. I regularly advise people not to trust random lone people on Instagram. He pauses, savoring the irony. Like me.

I always get sneezy and congested around the holidays. Is my Christmas tree to blame? The holiday season can be a time filled with, sometimes, itchy eyes, irritated skin, congestion, and wheezing. This cluster of symptoms, sometimes referred to as Christmas tree syndrome, typically does not stem from an allergy to the Christmas tree itself. But sometimes certain hitchhikers on the tree, like mold or dust, can cause an allergic reaction. And if you are sensitive to the fragrance or sap of the tree, that can also irritate your skin or airways. Thankfully, there are ways to minimize the risk that your Christmas tree will turn you into a sneezing, sniffing Scrooge. What are the potential triggers? Typically, when people are allergic to trees, they are allergic to their pollen, the powdery substance that plants produce during reproduction. But evergreen pollens are less likely to induce an allergic reaction than other tree pollens, and trees do not usually produce pollen around this time of year, so it is unlikely that a person would be truly allergic to their Christmas tree. Mold may also grow more easily if the tree is stored or transported in an unventilated, damp space. Anything with a strong fragrance can be an irritant. Sap. Touching your Christmas tree, and especially its sap or resin, a thick substance that trees release after injury, could irritate your skin, too.

resulting in itching or a rash. If the needles of the tree poke you that may also cause irritation or a rash. Dust and other debris. If your tree is grown in a dusty area or transported through one like a dirt road or construction site it may bring dust into your house. If you have an artificial Christmas tree you may not be in the clear either. People usually are not allergic to fake Christmas trees but because the trees are often stored for much of the year in dirty lofts or storage spaces they can easily accumulate dust mites and mold. Asthma can be triggered after climbing into attics and to unpack an artificial tree. How can you manage the symptoms? If you are experiencing respiratory symptoms around your tree air purifiers containing HEPA filters can help by removing mold and other irritants from the air. You can also try to kill any mold that might be lurking on your tree. Try running a dehumidifier. You can also purchase a hygrometer which measures relative humidity for less than 15 dollars. You could also take decongestants to alleviate your symptoms. If you develop skin irritation after touching your tree try creating a barrier between your skin and the tree by wearing long sleeves and gloves the next time you need to touch it. When putting up a potentially dusty or moldy artificial Christmas tree consider wearing a mask like an N95 that can filter out dust while you are moving or assembling it.

A daughter of Transportation Secretary Sean Duffy denounced an absurdly invasive pat down at a Transportation Security Administration checkpoint Thursday on social media suggesting that if her father were in charge of the agency he would try to abolish it. In a series of posts on X EDA claimed that she had nearly missed her flight after declining to go through the body scanner. Ms. Duffy Alfonso who said she is pregnant said she waited 15 minutes for a pat down. She said the TSA agents whom she described as passive aggressive tried to pressure her to pass through the scanner insisting it was safe for pregnant passengers. According to the TSA all airport screening equipment including metal detectors and body scanners is safe for pregnant travelers. But passengers can opt out and instead receive a

physical pat down the agency said on its website. The body scanners at U.S. airports rely on millimeter wave technology that uses radio waves not X-rays. This type of technology emits far less energy than a cellphone according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The TSA has made several major changes to its screening process this year including allowing all travelers to keep their shoes on and requiring Real ID compliant documents for domestic air travel. A TSA spokesperson said the agency was aware of the incident and took complaints about airport security screening seriously.

The EU is poised to water down its plans to ban the production of gas and diesel powered cars by 2035. Members of Parliament voted on Wednesday to delay the rollout of a groundbreaking deforestation law that would affect far flung corners of the globe. And early this year lawmakers chipped away at the scope and scale of new disclosure requirements meant to force companies to be more forthcoming about the environmental impact of their operations. It is not a pivot that is on par with the U-turn the U.S. has taken on climate this year. Europe still has some of the strongest climate commitments in the world with a goal of reaching net zero emissions by 2050. But the events of 2025 experts say are reflective of increasing worries that EU regulations will slow economic growth. First it was climate policy no matter what said a research fellow at the University of California Berkeley who studies European politics. Now it is climate policy yes but as long as it is not completely detrimental to competitiveness. Here are some of the policies under the microscope. Combustion engines. This week EU officials introduced a proposal. Instead of requiring automakers to produce zero emissions cars the revised version of the rules would require a 90 percent reduction in tailpipe emissions starting that year. Automakers would be required to offset the remaining 10 percent with low carbon steel or alternative fuels. The change follows intense lobbying from European automakers as they face US tariff pressure and surging competition from Chinese manufacturers. This year the Trump administration along with Republicans in Congress eliminated tax credits for electric vehicle buyers and blocked the California plans to phase out the sales of new gas powered vehicles by 2035. This month the administration moved to weaken fuel efficiency requirements for new cars and light trucks that would have forced automakers to sell more electric and hybrid vehicles. Deforestation delay Part 2. In 2023 the European Union passed a bold law aimed at preserving forests around the world by banning imported goods linked to deforestation. On Wednesday legislators voted to delay the law for a second time. The rules govern products containing seven land intensive commodities: cattle, cocoa, coffee, palm oil, soybeans, rubber, and wood. They require companies to monitor their supply chains to ensure these materials are not sourced from land that has been converted from forest to agriculture since 2020. It is a vast and complicated task and the law has drawn pushback. Companies balked. The Indonesia economic minister called the plan regulatory imperialism objecting to European efforts to impose environmental standards on economically important industries in other nations. Some EU member countries asked for a delay and so did the Biden administration. Last December the EU granted a one year reprieve. As the 2025 deadline inched closer lawmakers again grew concerned this time that the record keeping requirements would overwhelm an IT system used to collect paperwork. The EU Parliament voted to delay it for another year and simplify some of the

reporting requirements The heart of the EU deforestation regulation remains intact a German member of the European Parliament said in a statement **This agreement takes the concerns of farmers foresters and businesses seriously and ensures that the regulation can be implemented in a practical and workable way** What is next There are new European climate laws that the world may have to adjust to On Tuesday the Trump administration was seeking an exemption from the methane law for American oil and gas companies **China has balked at both the emissions border tax and the deforestation rule** These climate policies were intended to lay the track for other countries to follow examples of what has been called the Brussels effect But it is not clear if the rest of the world will comply I think there is a concern that Europe is trying to lead a fight and it is going to find itself alone in this fight The other big players China and Russia or the United States at the moment are not even thinking about it The average US household is projected to spend nearly 1 thousand dollars this winter to heat its home up 9 point 2 percent from a year earlier according to the National Energy Assistance Directors Association which represents state governments in securing federal money At the same time the budget for a critical federal program to help low income Americans pay for heat has been cut by about a third this year compared with two years ago In the first 90 days after the Los Angeles fires there was a 46 percent increase in emergency room visits for heart attack symptoms at the Los Angeles Cedars Sinai hospital Global coal use has hit a ceiling and is set to begin a slow decline over the next five years as renewables and liquefied natural gas gain ground But in the United States coal use is set to jump 8 percent this year after more than a decade of annual declines Ten years after the landmark Paris Agreement China now dominates almost every element of the global clean energy economy As a result Heatmap News writes the climate story has become the China story Here is our look at how things have changed in the decade since Paris

9 Ukraine Sea Babies With Attacks on Oil Tankers Ukraine Takes Aim at the War of Russia Financing Strikes on four vessels signal that Kyiv is willing to expand the maritime theater of the conflict in an effort to crimp the Moscow military funding Photo of an aerial view of speedboat drones Satellite controlled speedboat drones designed and operated by the Ukraine military intelligence service Called Sea Babies they are packed with explosives and can travel long distances **Excerpts edited by RAWSEP for brevity and clarity and relationship to Residents Against Wood Smoke Emission Particulates a 501C3 nonprofit organization** The New York Times December 20 2025 Ukraine has used drones four times in the past few weeks to hit oil tankers from the Russian shadow fleet escalating the war in the seas and showing that the Ukraine security services agency feels increasingly emboldened to launch audacious attacks and claim them publicly One ship was struck by aerial drones on Thursday night in the Mediterranean Sea more than 12 hundred miles away from Ukraine The other three were hit by sea drones in the Black Sea The attacks are the first on the Russia sanction defying oil tankers that Ukraine has acknowledged since the Russian full scale invasion in 2022 The security agency also said it had attacked Russian oil production platforms in the Caspian Sea four times in the past 10 days including on Thursday The oil business fuels the Russian economy and its war and throughout the conflict the West has tried to crack down on its profits with sanctions The Kairos and the Virat both sanctioned by the European Union yet sailing under the flag of Gambia were hit on November 28 off Turkey A few days later Putin termed the attacks piracy and threatened Ukrainian ports ships using those ports and the ships of countries that help Ukraine The most radical solution would be to cut Ukraine off from the sea effectively making it impossible for it to engage in piracy at all Putin said The SBU then claimed credit for a strike on December 10 on the Dashan a tanker sanctioned by the European Union that kept its transponder off as it sailed through the Ukraine exclusive economic zone under the flag of the Comoros a tiny country off southeastern Africa The Kremlin did not comment on that attack But the next night Russia started pounding Odesa the largest port city of Ukraine on the Black Sea with waves of drones and missiles Those attacks have continued for more than a week On Friday night ballistic missiles hit the Odesa port infrastructure killing at least eight people On Monday Klymenko the shadow fleet analyst

said he had located the Virat at a shipyard in Turkey undergoing repairs. He was one of several open source researchers to observe this. According to those experts the vessel had a new name Prometey and was also flying a new flag which was Russian.
